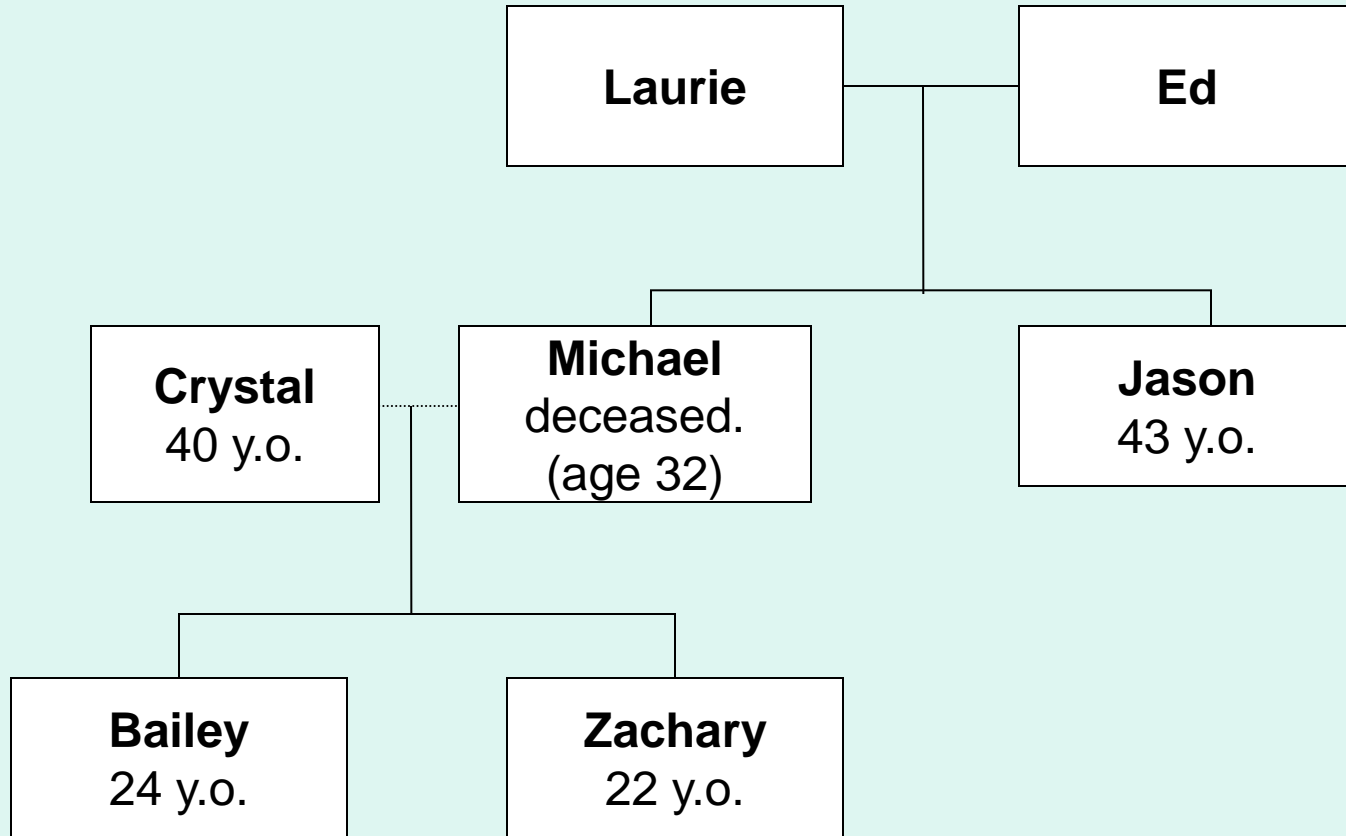
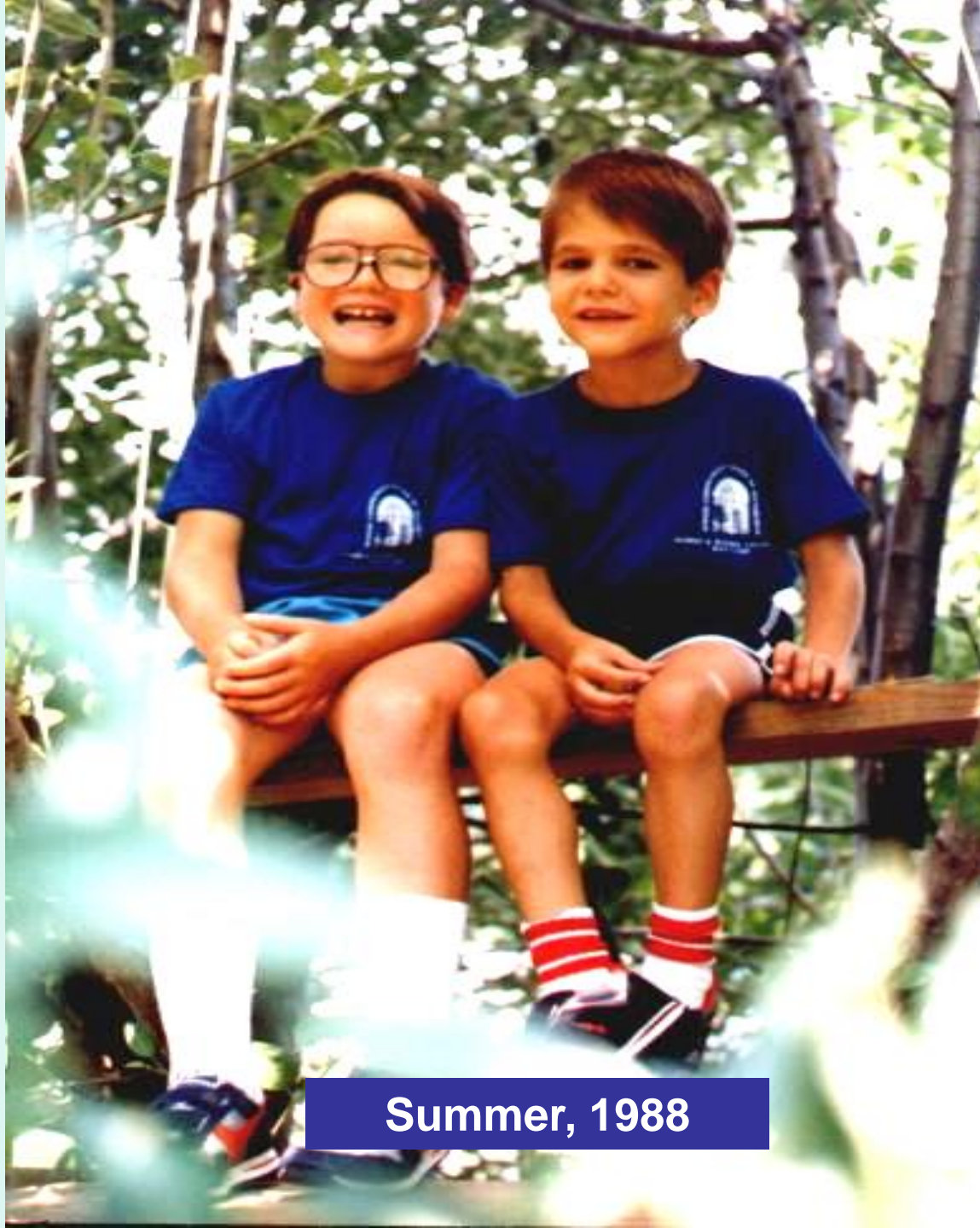

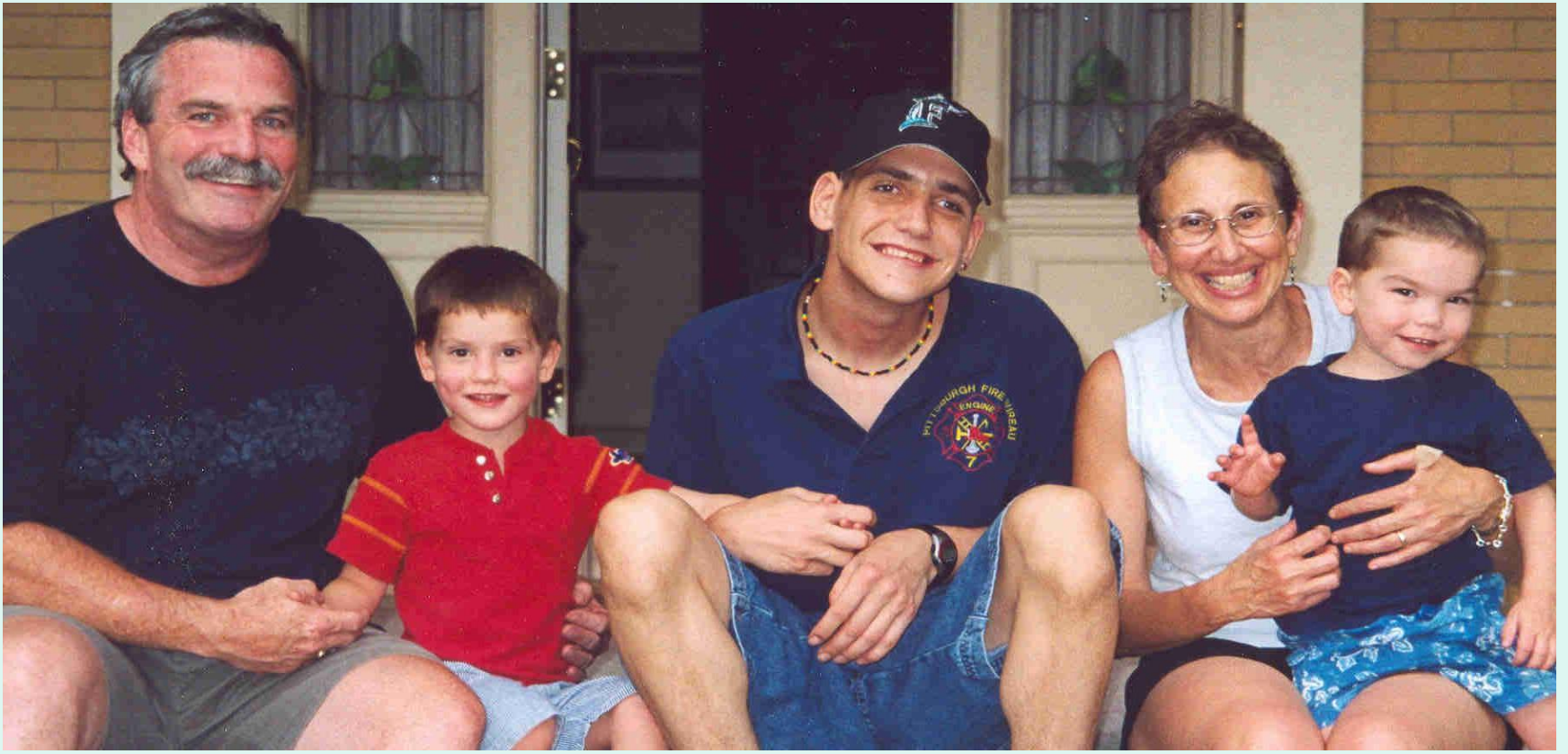

Services Involved (estimates)

- **6 residential placements**

- **6 case managers**

- **1 sexual offender registration**

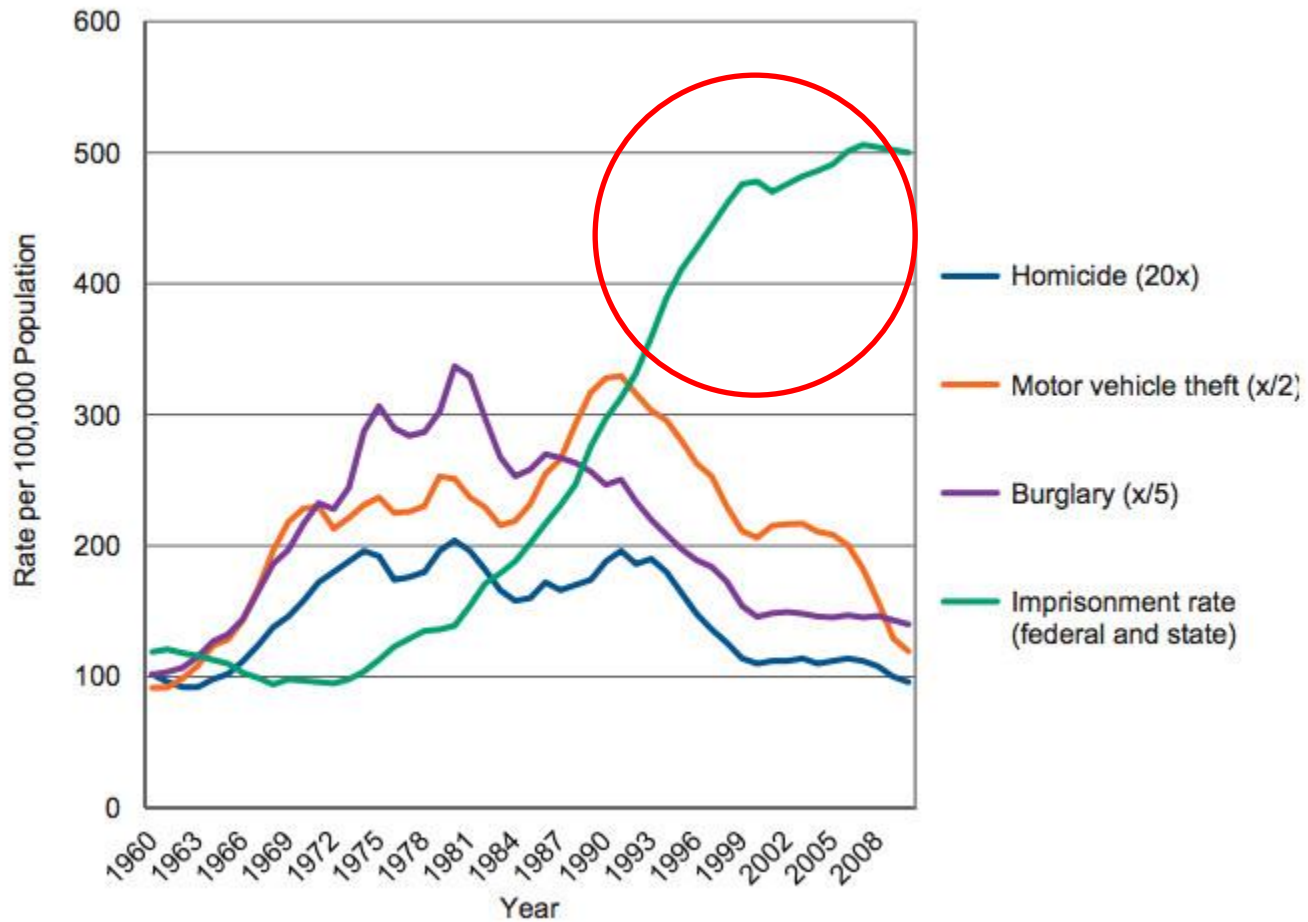

Specialty Courts

Allegheny County Mental Health Court as an example



Mental health court serves about 400 people per year (NONVIOLENT OFFENSES)

The jail processes approximately 16,000 people per year

Conservative prevalence estimate of people with serious mental illness in the jail on a given day = 15% ($.15 \times 16,000 = 2,400$ in a year)

$400/2,400 = .17$ of people with a serious mental illness in jail in a year
